# **Summary of Feedback**

#### **December 2016**

3 x regional events in Carmarthen, Conwy and Nantgarw: 72 members including 5 leaders attended, from 15 authorities<sup>1</sup>.

### **General Comments:**

 Members were broadly supportive of the Cabinet Secretary's proposed reforms (although some disagreed or had concerns about certain aspects).

- There was a consistent message from all sessions that strong local accountability and local democracy needed to balance any move towards greater regional service commissioning or management. In particular:
  - Funding should continue to be distributed to the 22 local authorities via the RSG, who would then agree the budgets and funding of any regional services'
  - Statutory duties should remain with the 22 local authorities, who would then determine how such duties would be discharged, either jointly or via another lead authority; and
  - Local accountability through local councillors' oversight and scrutiny is essential in holding regional services to account and ensuring that the needs of local communities are being met and outcomes are being delivered.
- A number of members however felt the timing was wrong ahead of the local elections and that newly elected councils needed to be engaged after the elections
- There was a general lack of understanding of what the terms 'mandatory' and 'systematic' meant. This will need to be clarified in the White Paper.

# **Footprints**

- There was general, though not unanimous, support for the Cabinet Secretary's proposed LHB and Economic Development footprints.
- Some members also expressed cynicism about the direction of travel and concerns about complexity and the risk of diminution of local accountability and local democracy.
- North Wales members were most comfortable with the proposed footprints given the footprints are coterminous and their experience of working across these existing footprints. There were some comments regarding economic development however, suggesting that the North Eastern authorities looking increasingly to the North West of England with the Mersey Dee Alliance.
- There was more discussion in South West and South East Wales about the respective 'fit' of different footprints, given the different regions covered by LHBs and economic development regions, as well as the fact that a number of existing collaborations crossed these boundaries.
- A number of members therefore called for existing and successful collaborations to remain and also more scope for bottom-up collaborations based on business case rather than 'mandating'. 'Form should follow function' was a phrase that was used frequently.
- A number of members expressed concern about the risk of marginalization for those councils or communities in rural areas or on the periphery of the regions, in particular in city region areas.
- The potential for sub-regional working was a theme in North and South West sessions, particularly as Betsi Cadwallader and Hywel Dda Health Boards operate sub-regional management arrangements given their geographical scale.

- A number of members stressed the role to be played by community and town councils.
- South East Wales noted the impact on regionalization on third sector partners ability to engage in and deliver certain services, given the third sectors' strength often lay in their community links.

#### **Services**

In addition to the Cabinet Secretary's proposed services, the following were suggested, though some had greater support than others:

- Social services generally agreed, although the point was made that certain functions within social services were more appropriately delivered regionally/locally.
- Strategic planning on economic development footprint, although local development control should remain local
- Back-office functions ICT, payroll, audit, legal and HR
- Public protection mixed views, some recognized links to health, others to economic development, others felt this should remain a local service.

#### Governance

- Governance arrangements should be the building blocks built into collaborations from the beginning – finance, governance and scrutiny.
- 'Horses for courses' was a frequent comment and the general theme was that arrangements should be appropriate and proportionate to the functions/services concerned.
- The most familiar form of governance model was a lead authority or joint committee.
- Local accountability to local members was a consistently strong theme, with a
  common view that regional arrangements should be subject to local scrutiny.
  Whilst joint scrutiny at certain stages was appropriate, local scrutiny remained
  critical in holding regional services to account and ensuring that the needs of
  local communities are being met and outcomes are being delivered.
- It was generally felt that, despite some exceptions, scrutiny of collaborative arrangements had not been as effective as it could have been to date.
- Similarly, concerns were raised by some councillors about the governance and scrutiny arrangements of emerging city region developments.
- Pre-decision scrutiny was seen as important and many felt that had been largely missing in current collaborative models with members only able to scrutinize once a decision had been made.
- Regular information-flow and reporting back to councils is therefore important to ensure members can engage through scrutiny and so they can keep informed and inform the public.
- Collaborative governance brings with it administrative complexity and bureaucracy and a need to align or coordinate council meeting calendars to allow timely pre-decision scrutiny, decision-making and scrutiny call-in

• Larger, more complex collaborations will have implications in terms of individual and collective audit and risk management.

# **Funding**

- Funding should continue to be distributed to the 22 local authorities as this
  was key to local accountability;
- Issues in terms of formula distribution and equity across very diverse (economy, population and deprivation) councils;
- Issues in terms of standardization of services across a region, councils currently investing at different levels, this will cause huge disruption and volatility;
- Similarly, pay and terms and conditions harmonization across regions will be challenging.
- Concerns about the future finances of social services and that regionalized services will only go so far in managing the financial pressures.

#### **Local Councillor and the Citizen**

This session explored some of the local accountability issues in more detail:

- Role of councillor ever more challenging
- Councillors need support, guidance and training to understand role.
- Councillors need ready access to information to signpost the public e.g clear guide for all councillors – A-Z of who does what (locally and regionally), named officers and partners
- Constitutions should be fit for purpose with clear rights and entitlements for councillors clearly outlined.
- Impact of regional footprints on councillors' travelling time may have to attend meetings further afield. Options for video-conferencing?
- Scope for increased use of IT including apps on phones (e.g. photographing potholes, flytipping etc.), councillor referral systems and webcasting/remote attendance
- Councillors need to be part of designing new services, it's not just about designing services with communities – informal briefings, workshops through to formal sessions with scrutiny.
- Some members expressed concerns that a councillors' role would become a 'signposters' rather than a representative.

Following on from our chat of last week, the attached and below is where our latest thinking is. The 3x member events would be held on:

- Friday 16<sup>th</sup> December (AM) South Wales - South Central Education Consortium, Nantgarw - I'm conscious this clashes with the Central South West Wales Regional Board, but our session won't target leaders (who attend the board) and it's a different region too, that said, I appreciate some of you will be attending the Regional Board meeting.
- Monday 19<sup>th</sup> December (PM) North Wales Conwy Business Centre, Llandudno junction

In terms of facilitation, given the nature of the engagement we don't feel that it will be necessary to bring in external support, but will have a serious of round-table discussions (with members split into groups of executive members, scrutiny members, planning members etc.) to go through a prepared set of questions with tables reporting back key points. Sarah and I will do any necessary facilitation.

#### Dear Colleague

The Cabinet Secretary for Finance and Local Government made an oral statement to the National Assembly on 4 October, setting out broad proposals for local government reform based on the discussions over the summer with all twenty-two local authorities. The emerging proposition for structural change is summarised below:

- The 22 Local Authorities would remain, subject to any voluntary mergers, and would act as the democratic tier which councillors would be elected to and be the front-door for citizens to access services.
- Welsh Government would offer support to enable voluntary mergers to take place.
- There would be an enhanced level of regional working which would be systematic and mandatory, and include a rationalisation of the multiple footprints on which current arrangements operate.
- Two footprints emerged from the summer engagement as having particular relevance: one based around the City Regions and other economic development groupings, which was relevant to functions like strategic transport, strategic land-use planning and economic development; and the other based on the Health Board footprint, which could be relevant to functions like social services, education and public protection.
- A greater development of shared services.

Welsh Government is keen to work with local government and other stakeholders to test and develop the detail of the proposals ahead of formal consultation next year. We will be holding three workshop events, as follows:

- 2 December 2016, 10:00-16:00, (Brangwyn Hall, Swansea)
- 6 December 2016, 10:00-16:00, (Coleg Cambria Deeside, Connah's Quay)
   9 December 2016, 10:00-16:00, (Orbit Business Centre, Merthyr Tydfil)
