The section begins with a substantial number of estimates (tables 13.1 - 13.12) which aim to illuminate various aspects of the way in which people in Wales spend their leisure time or are influenced by leisure activities. Despite the number of tables the coverage is far from comprehensive. In part this is unavoidable as the ways in which people can occupy their leisure would themselves be difficult to count and identify. It is also because there is little information which is specific to particular activities. This is true even of mainline sports (just how many people play football or hockey at some level or other in an average week?); it is self-evidently the case over a wider range of pastimes (how many play chess or do crosswords?).

Nonetheless the whole area of leisure activities was deemed to be sufficiently important to warrant coverage even if some of the available statistics were of a lower quality than those in other sections. The material is often indirect and partial, but both the range and the recent nature of coverage are themselves strong evidence of a growing interest in the extent and nature of leisure. It would be hazardous to conclude from this too much about longerrun shifts in either the amount of leisuretime available to people, or of the range (as opposed to nature) of leisure activities pursued: some part of the interest arises simply from the economic opportunities provided when spending on basics (food, clothing) takes up a smaller proportion of average incomes. The commercial motivation is reflected in the source of some of the tables included in this section.

In some cases the nature of the material, it must be confessed, throws less light on the general picture than was hoped. It is often asserted, and with much impressionistic evidence, that fishing is the (or certainly a) major participating leisure activity. It was desirable to exhibit this statistically and the series on rod licences seemed to provide a reasonable proxy (Table 13.1), accepting that this would not cover all those who fished in Wales. The series has, however, considerable deficiencies as a proxy

measure both because it only covers a particular (untypical?) class of licence and because the institutional change in the licensing authority (from Dwr Cymru to the National Rivers Authority in 1989) might have introduced policy changes on the issue of licences. Similarly the information on tourism (Table 13.2) needs interpretation. It is not saying anything about the (for this section) more relevant issue of the Welsh as tourists, but about the importance of tourism to the Welsh economy. Within that context it then needs to be noted that it is based on surveys of bed nights occupied, which does not allow tourism as a reason for occupancy to be distinguished from such other reasons as business trips.

The information on libraries (Table 13.3) is statistically more satisfactory since it has been directly provided and is reasonably comprehensive in what it covers. It provides indications about the extent of library provision in Wales (where the trends in the number of staff are probably the most reliable guide); the nature of the provision (discs, tapes and cassettes as well as books); and serves as a rough proxy for reading as a leisure activity. The amount of public assistance to the arts in Wales (Table 13.4) can also be taken as a reliable series. showing on the supply side the extent of public provision in Wales and also the detailed distribution of that provision between music, drama, art, literature, dance and other activities in Wales. The demand side for one important leisure activity - the cinema - is shown in Tables 13.5 and 13.6. Table 13.5 records relatively hard data: Table 13.6 records the results of sample surveys taken annually. There is no inherent reason why such a survey should not provide reliable information. It is in some respects similar to political polls but with the

advantage of asking a more neutral and factual question, which respondents might answer more confidently (and honestly). In part this depends on the size and representativeness of the sample, and in this respect whilst the size is adequate for Wales (about 1,000), the numbers on which the area divisions are based (about 150 for Mid/West Wales) give less confidence.

These comments broadly apply to the six following tables (Tables 13.7 - 13.12) each of which is derived from surveys, some commercial, some from public bodies like the Sports Council for Wales and some drawn from the material supplied by voluntary participants to the official General Household Survey. They thus all carry something of the general health warning issued above, but to variable degrees to which the notes give some guidance. These cautionary comments should not misunderstood: in broad terms the tables are not likely to be misleading, especially on trends, while they do provide considerable illumination about many aspects of recent life in Wales.

surprise It will no-one that public participation in formal, organised religions has continued to dwindle. Unfortunately one of its accompaniments seems to be a paucity of information which would enable interested investigators to chart the course and composition of this decline. The definitional problems which such studies involve would naturally be as formidable as ever: there are doubts enough over what constitutes 'membership' of a church, let alone knowing the numbers of 'believers'. In the past, however, the main denominations each produced reasonably reliable handbooks or yearbooks which gave basic information and usually some guidance about its collection that could be used in the critical appraisal of the figures. Such exercises have become too patchy to permit a reasonable comprehensive cover: not only formal religion, but religious statistics are in need of revival. In face of this it was decided (Tables 13.13 - 13.15) to rely on the excellent surveys done for the Bible Society which, although only covering particular years, do cover all the major Welsh Christian denominations and explain the method of collection and the response rate.

A reasonable comment would be that, even so, religion is being defined as Christianity. It is recognised and accepted that the section needs, at the least, coverage of the practice in Wales of the world's other main religions. The only excuse is that a sufficiently useable and reliable series has not been established. A recent reference work (May, 1994) does suggest that in 1993 Cardiff had 8 mosques (Newport 7; Swansea 2, and Aberystwyth 1), 2 Hindu mandirs and 2 synagogues, whilst there were said to be 17 Buddhist meditation centres in Wales. And when we try to go beyond the major religions we are, as many would expect, cast into the outer darkness: collected statistical information on cults, sects, spiritual associations and other similar bodies and activities is non-existent.

This is in marked contrast to another area where it might be thought that the exercise of faith was, so to speak, fundamental. For politics (Tables 13.18 - 13.20) data are presented which are both hard and reliable. The explanation is straight-forward: issues about what constitutes membership or adherence to a particular party are avoided. Instead attention is confined to specific elections and their results, all of which are publicly recorded.

The section ends with six tables dealing with aspects of the environment. Perhaps there should have been more, but rightly or wrongly it was decided that the bulk of the growing material on this topic fell down because it was not of sufficiently general accessibility, sufficiently comprehensive or allowed for a reasonable series of years to be covered. The result has been to settle for three tables on land, two on water, and one on oil pollution.
